

# FROM THE PRESIDENT

I went up to Washington, DC with Ken recently for a visit, and was able to stop in the Spy Museum one afternoon. The mantra for the museum was "things are not what they seem". Interestingly, at the end of the museum tour, there was a whole section dedicated to "cybercrime" that focused on the vulnerability of our way of life to potential disruption of our communication infrastructure. What struck me was the placement of amateur radio on an equal level with the internet, banking, and medical networks. Imagine that... someone had the forethought to place amateur radio on the same level as our most important networks when it comes to maintaining vital communications for the nation and our world.

Later in the month, I saw an article on an earthquake communications preparedness forum held May 3rd where Federal Emergency Management Agency (**FEMA**) Administrator Craig Fugate described the Amateur Radio operator as "the ultimate backup, the originators of what we call social media."

Amateur radio: the originator of social media? What an important recognition of our hobby!

Speaking on the aftermath of the earthquake in Haiti, Fugate continued, "we get so sophisticated and we have gotten so used to the reliability and resilience in our wireless and wired and our broadcast industry and all of our public safety communications that we can never fathom that they'll fail. They do. They have. They will." While earthquakes have not been a major concern for the Lowcountry in over a 100 years, a perennial concern is hurricanes. Just as in Haiti, were Charleston to suffer a major hurricane, we will likely be called up to help our community, our region, and our state. Paraphrasing Mr. Fulgate, "Volunteers using assigned frequencies that they are allocated, their own equipment, their own money, nobody pays them, [will be] the first ones... getting word out in the critical first hours and first days as the rest of the systems [come] back up,"

I think we as the ambassadors for Amateur Radio in Charleston need to be plugged into emergency plans. But to be relevant to those plans, we have to be prepared. Field Day is an annual event that provides not only a lot of fun operating experiences, but it's also provides a time to work on our emergency plans – both with our communities and in our own personal emergency plans. Do you know how you would plug into our community's plans? Would you be prepared to help your community in a disaster? Do you have a disaster plan for your family? I'd like us to all be thinking on these questions during the upcoming Field Day weekend. Prepare now -- dust off that plan... or write one.

"They do. They have. They will." I keep coming back to Mr. Fulgate's words. It makes amateur radio all the more important... when all else fails.

Please join us at the next CARS club meeting on June 13<sup>th</sup> to help the club make plans for Field Day 2011. I'll look forward to seeing you there!
