Amateur radio knowledge transfer. A comment by Bryce/K4LXF at the June meeting about using the area repeaters got me thinking about the subject. There's a lot of collective knowledge about amateur radio in the Charleston area. How does one get to it, especially if you're a new ham? There are a few regular opportunities to meet up with other hams, like the Monday/Wednesday/Friday breakfast gatherings at the Bojangles at I-26 and Ashley Phosphate, Saturday morning breakfast at the IHOP/IHOB across from the same Bojangles, the monthly meetings, and operating days on the Yorktown. You can also call someone up over the phone, or on the radio.

I think the operating days would make a great opportunity for hams of all experience levels to get together and share what they know. Let me introduce the concept of Barcamp, for those who might not be familiar. Barcamp is a type of conference/meeting where the attendees set the agenda and decide on the presentation topics, rather than being set beforehand. The origins of Barcamp come from the early days of the computer tech world (search the Internet for Barcamp and Foocamp if you want to learn more). People get together, throw out some topics that they want to present on or something they know about, and give a short talk on the subject. It could be just an overview, a deep dive, or something in between. It could be a demonstration, a workshop, or just a Q&A session. It can be a topic you're deeply familiar with, or something that you just learned about yesterday. The whole point is that everybody knows something, and is sharing it with other people who want to learn about it.

What are your thoughts on ways to share knowledge with fellow hams?

A few comments about joining a Net

To help the communications on the Net go smoothly, please remember these few items:

Most Nets are open to all licensed Hams, to participate in. There are some Nets that want you to register with them, on line, to receive a member number. Other Nets will ask specific members to check-in first, they then open the Net to all licensed Hams.

Nets are a good way to get experience participating in Ham Radio protocol. Most Nets ask for checkins, for example, from Alpha to Foxtrot, then Golf to Lima, then Mike to Romeo, and finally Sierra to Zulu. They are asking for check-ins using the first letter after your Call Sign's number. For example if your call is "X X 4 <u>C</u> X X", you would check in with the Alpha to Foxtrot section. This is just to try to organize the number of people checking-in. If you check-in early or late, don't worry, no one will punish you.

Here are a few more items, to remember about checking-in to a Net:

First – Please do not call the Net Controller by his/her call sign. All stations should please just call "Net Control". This way if the Net Controller is changed or replaced, there will be less confusion.

Second – To give the repeaters (about 20 repeaters locally and about 30 repeaters statewide) time to link up, when checking in, please follow these guidelines:

Listen to make sure no one else is calling Net Control. There is no prize for being first.

Key your microphone and wait a second or two, to give all of the repeaters time to link up.

Call <u>Net Control</u> (not his/her call sign) and then un-key your microphone.

If you don't hear anyone else talking, key your microphone and wait another second or two,

Then slowly identify your station using standard international phonetics, give your call sign, name and location slowly.

Then un-key your microphone and listen to see if Net Control ask you any questions.

Third – Listen in as others check in; if Net Control has trouble hearing a station, you may be able to relay to him/her.

Fourth - If you hear an emergency announced, stand by to help with any assistance required.

Lastly – Just have fun and enjoy the hobby.
